GROUP SWIM LESSONS (CHILD)

Parent/Child Aquatot: (6months-3 years) The first swim class

Objective: Get child comfortable in the water using games and having the parents be there for support.

Main Skills: Getting used to the water, blowing bubbles, kicking on your stomach and back, floating all is done with the parents help.

LEVEL PRE-1: WATER ADJUSTMENT (3-4 YEARS) BEGINNER

Objective: To introduce young swimmers to their first swimming experience (with no parent in the water).

Main Skills: Water entry/exit, bubbles, beginning kick and arm stroke.

LEVEL 1: INTRODUCTION TO WATER SKILLS (4-6 YEARS) BEGINNER

Objective: To help young swimmers to feel comfortable in the water.

Main Skills: submerge face, assisted front/back float and kicking, alternating arm action.

LEVEL 2: FUNDAMENTAL AQUATIC SKILLS ENDURANCE

Objective: To build endurance on fundamental skills.

Main Skills: Breath control, back finning, front/back crawl, elementary backstroke and treading water.

PRIVATE SWIM LESSONS (ADULT OR CHILD)

Private lessons are offered to any age swimmer wanting to learn how to swim, improve swim strokes, or any level in between. Private lessons are offered year-round to fit your schedule. Lessons are 30 minutes in length and customized to the swimmer's ability. We also offer semi-private lessons. For more information and fee schedule go to **www.whitewaterafc.com**

RECREATION SUNSHINE FUND

The Whitewater Parks and Recreation Department believes in providing services and programs to all who wish to participate, regardless of financial status. A fund has been created to assist those who wish to participate in our programs but do not have the financial ability to do so. Applicants must live within the Whitewater Unified School District boundaries and approved applicants will need to pay half of the program cost. To apply, please request a copy of the application from the Parks and Recreation Department. All requests are confidential. Applicants need to submit a request form for each request. Applications will not be accepted for program registrations that have previously been processed and the approval will be based on the availability of funds in the Recreation Sunshine Fund.

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM-SCHOOL YEAR PROGRAM

The Whitewater Parks & Recreation Department is excited to start the 2024-2025 school year offering an After School Program. The program runs from the first day of school in Fall until the last day of school in the Spring. The program will take place at Lincoln Elementary, Lakeview Elementary, and Washington Elementary. This program is for grades Afternoon Pre- K- 5th.

Q: Am I required to attend every day of the week?

A: No. You may sign up for any and as many days as you would like. You will receive a calendar every month that you can specifically mark the days you wish to attend.





Q: How many staff are at the Whitewater Parks & Recreation After School Program?

A: We follow State guidelines and have at least a 10:1 child to staff ratio. There will also be two staff members every day even if there are less than ten kids.

Q: Is this program State Licensed?

- A: The After School Program follows all state guidelines but is exempt from mandatory licenses and does so as a courtesy to keeping the costs lower to participants.
- **Q:** What are the hours of the program and can I pick my child up early?
- A: The after school program will start at the conclusion of school at 3:00p.m. and conclude at 6:00p.m. You can pick up your child at any point of the program with one fee.

Q: Sounds great! Where do I sign up?

A: Visit www.wwparks.org and click on the After School Tab for lots of fun information. All registrations must take place through Rec Desk.



TAE KWON DO AND SELF-DEFENSE – YEAR ROUND PROGRAM

This is an introductory class for the art of Tae Kwon Do which loosely translates to the way of the foot and fist. In this course kids will learn all the basic punches, kicks, and blocks through a variety of fun drills and games. In addition to the physical conditioning, the kids will learn basic tenets of martial arts such as respect and discipline. Besides Tae Kwon Do, the students will have the chance to learn and practice self-defense techniques that can be applied in real life situations. All skill levels are welcome. WHAT IS THE ARBORETUM AT STARIN PARK?

Thirty-five acres. Nearly a thousand trees. Over sixty species (many identified with informative tags). Adult workshops, school field trips. Places for contemplation, relaxation, outdoor exercise, forest bathing (Shinrin-Yoku), phenology, reconnecting to nature. Special growing areas, including the savanna playground, the shelter circle, and the food forest (with more to come), along with an interpretive path and explanatory signage. That's The Arboretum At Starin Park (in a nutshell).

The Arboretum At Starin Park is, and will increasingly become, a beautiful, welcoming sanctuary for humans, native trees, shrubs, and perennials, and for wildlife. It will be a place where people of all ages can come to connect to nature, learn about the environment, and study and practice stewardship.

The Arboretum At Starin Park has been recognized by ArbNet as a Level 1 Arboretum, has been awarded a large grant from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and has received generous support from local businesses, foundations, and individuals.

Under the direction of the Parks and Recreation Department and the guidance of the Urban Forestry Commission, The Arboretum At Starin Park works to improve the tree canopy across the community as well as in the park. The annual tree sale, held in April around Arbor Day/Earth Day provides top quality, hard-to-find, native trees and shrubs at attractive prices.

FACILITY RENTALS

Reservations for city facilities can be made through the Parks and Recreation Department. All reservations can be made online along with a complete facility reservation policy at wwparks.org.

- Municipal facilities can be reserved from 6:00 am until 11:00 pm.
- No alcohol is allowed in city parks and facilities except by permit.
- Alcohol permits are \$10.00 and must be applied for with the City Clerk's office two weeks prior to the event.
- A security/damage deposit of \$200.00 is required for all reservations at the Cravath Lakefront Community Center, Armory, and Starin Park Community Building.
- Credit card use is acceptable for rentals and damage deposits.
- The use of tent structures must be approved at time of facility request submission.

The facilities listed below must be rented a minimum of four (4) hours. Online reservations will be posted in four (4), eight (8), and sixteen (16) hour blocks. Requests outside of these blocks should be addressed with Parks and Recreation staff. Each facility is equipped with tables and chairs and small serving kitchens.

WHITEWATER COMMON COUNCIL

The City of Whitewater operates under the City Manager form of government with a seven- member Common Council. The City Manager plans and directs the administration of the City to ensure that efficient municipal services are provided and are in line with Common Council objectives. Council Members are elected each April to serve two-year terms. There are five aldermanic district council positions and two councilmember-at large positions. Odd number district seats are up for election in odd years; seats for evennumbered districts are up for election in even-numbered years. One council member-at-large seat opens each calendar year. The Common Council meets on the first and third Tuesdavs of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Community Room of the Municipal Building located

at 312 W. Whitewater St., Whitewater, WI 53190 (meetings can be virtual, too). However, if there is an election scheduled on a council meeting Tuesday, the meeting is rescheduled for the Thursday following the regularly scheduled meeting.

Alcohol in Parks

Anyone wishing to consume alcoholic beverages in a city park needs a permit. Permits can be found on the City Clerk's web page at https://www.whitewater-wi. gov/174/Licensing or at the City Clerk's Office. Submit applications to the City Clerk, along with the \$10 fee (checks payable to the City of Whitewater), at least five days prior to the event.

A Beverage Operator's License is required of those who wish to work unsupervised at an establishment which sells beer or any alcohol product, whether sold in packaged form or by the glass. Complete and submit the application and license fee (1 year license: \$20.00 2 year license: \$30.00) along with proof of enrollment in, or completion of a Responsible Beverage Server Training Course as approved by the State of Wisconsin. CITATION PROCEDURES

After Receiving Your Citation:

You must either: A) Post bond and/or enter a plea by mail or in person. B) Appear in court on your court date.

Types of Pleas:

Not Guilty: Must be entered in writing before your court date or during you court date.

Guilty or No Contest: Will result in finding of guilty. If you do not pay a levied fine, a warrant may be issued for your arrest. If your violation was a moving traffic violation your driving privileges could be suspended for up to 1 year. After 90 days, your file will be referred to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) for collection. The DOR will add to the balance owing on the debt a collection fee of 15% of the debt or \$35, whichever is greater. For additional information: www. whitewater-wi.gov/234/Municipal-Court

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The City of Whitewater is committed to a robust Economic Development Program that benefits the entire City of Whitewater, its residents and businesses.

Economic Development Team

The City funds a full time Economic Development Director who also serves as the Executive Director of the Community Development Authority (CDA). The Director leads a team of City staff and business development consultants to stimulate investment and coordinate the policies of the CDA.

Programs & Incentives

The City of Whitewater promotes investment in the community and offers several loan and grant programs, as well as Tax Incremental Financing (TIF) opportunities aimed at stimulating development and job growth.

Shovel Ready Sites

The Whitewater Business & Technology Park offers development sites ranging from 1 acre to 21+ acres, with infrastructure in place at the curb. Incentives are available depending on the project.

Whitewater University Innovation Center

Created through a partnership between the City and UW-Whitewater, the Innovation Center located at 1221 Innovation Drive is the cornerstone of the Technology Park and serves as a business incubator for entrepreneurs.

Community Development Authority (CDA)

The CDA administers Ioan and grant programs and makes recommendations to the Common Council on city land sales, real estate purchases or remediations, and tax increment financing. The public is welcome to attend the monthly CDA meetings in the Community Room of the Municipal Building (virtual option available). Refer to website for additional meeting information.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

The Finance Department Manages the City's day-to-day finances. Budgeting, investments, payroll, accounts payable and accounts receivable. Issues, accepts, and processes Water/Sewer utility payments. Issues, accepts tax payments and processes property and personal property taxes December – January 31st. (After January 31st payments must go to the appropriate county office.) Issues, accepts and processes miscellaneous invoice payments. Issues dog licenses and accepts court payments when the Clerk of Court is not available.

Utility Billing: For questions regarding your bill, property ownership/address changes, or a final meter reading, contact the Utility Billing Technician at 262-473-1383.

Utility Bill Pay: Utility payments can be made online or over the phone at no charge through our third-party processor PSN–Payment Service-Network. Go to www.whitewater-wi. gov and click on the Online Bill Pav button. Choose Utility Bill Payment. Login or if you are a first-time user you will need to create an account. Your Utility Bill account number will be needed to set up your account. It will take 24 hours to load your billing information and history. We also offer an IVR (pay by phone) service at (877) 885-7968 option 1. Utility bills may also be paid in person at City Hall at the Finance/Utility window, by mail (City Hall, Municipal Building, Utility Billing, 312 W. Whitewater St., Whitewater, WI 53190), or put in the payment drop box. The drop box is located near the front entrance of City Hall.

HUMAN RESOURCES

WHITEWATER FIRE & EMS

Whitewater Fire & EMS is a combination department consisting of 15 full-time and 15 paid on call employees. 12 of the 15 full-time employees work a rotational 24-hour shift, with 4 per shift. These firefighters handle the majority of EMS calls and fire alarm responses. Greater alarms, motor vehicle accidents, or incidents of greater magnitude require paid on call members who wear pagers to respond to the station to assist with mitigation of the incident. Three ambulances and 14 fire apparatus respond to over 1900 calls for service within the City of Whitewater and five surrounding townships, totaling 100 square miles.

In 2023, Whitewater Fire & EMS converted from a basic life support service to an advance life support service by providing Paramedic level pre-hospital care. This greatly increased the caliber of service the department provides to citizens and visitors of the greater Whitewater area.

Whitewater Fire and EMS also provides fire inspection/prevention services to the City of Whitewater and the contracted surrounding townships in accordance with State of Wisconsin Administrative Code.

The Whitewater Police Department is partnering with Walworth County Crime Stoppers to provide an easy and secure option for submitting anonymous community crime tips. Community members can access P3 Tips via their web site at http://www.p3tips.com or by downloading the app from the App Store or Google play. Tips are still welcomed through the Crime Stoppers hotline by dialing 262-723- 2677. Tips submitted through the P3 Tips sophisticated encryption processes obscure any and all identifying information and provide assured anonymity for tipsters.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Animal owners must have their dogs and/ or cats under voice command or on a leash. If your animal is at-large it will be impounded at Lakeland Animal Shelter. Dogs must be licensed through the City of Whitewater. Licenses may be purchased at the Finance Department. Animals which habitually bark or cry are prohibited. Citations can be issued for noncompliance of these ordinances.

LOST/FOUND PROPERTY

Individuals seeking lost/found property must come to the Whitewater Police Department Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 4:30 pm, and be prepared to present either written documentation or give a verbal confirmation of ownership.

SELLING ALCOHOL

It is against the law to charge for alcoholic beverages at the door of a party, charge for alcoholic beverages in a package deal (such as providing beer with dinner, selling cups to fill with free beer or charge for a band or other entertainment and "give away" the alcohol, etc.) or to be frequenting a place of illegal activity such as a party where alcohol is being served illegally.

GUIDELINE FOR PARTIES & SPECIAL EVENTS

The following is a list of suggestions for all Whitewater residents regarding hosting parties:

- Visit surrounding neighbors, be friendly, and make sure they know a couple of days in advance that a party will occur.
- Ask guests to respect the neighbors. The host is responsible for the condition of the neighborhood after the party.
- Do not advertise alcohol-related parties to the general public.
- Monitor your party. Keep it under control and make sure that volume levels do not cause a disturbance.
- Do not sponsor large open parties which tend to get out of control.
- Do not allow underage drinking.
- Do not carry/ open containers of alcoholic beverages beyond your private property. This is illegal in Whitewater even if you are over 21years of age.
- Do not let anyone drive home under the influence of alcohol

The City of Whitewater Neighborhood Services Department handles construction and building permits, planning for the city, and neighborhood code enforcement. In an effort to keep Whitewater beautiful, Neighborhood Services would like to remind residents of certain rules, guidelines and services.

Make sure you are living legally

How many non-family household members can I have in a single-family house? If you are in an R-1 or R-2 Zoning districts anywhere in the city you can only have 3 unrelated non-family household members. If you are in the R-3 Zoning anywhere in the city you cannot have more than 5 unrelated non-family household members. Don't skip the permit

Grass Length

Grass length should not exceed seven (7) inches in height Sections 11.56.010(4) and 11.56.010(5) of this title.

Sidewalks

Sidewalks must be cleared of snow and ice within 24 hours of a snow storm ending.

Litter and Other Debris

homeowners and tenants in residential neighborhoods are responsible for keeping the property free of all litter, junk and other unsightly debris.

Outdoor Furnishings

Only furniture designed for outdoor use may be placed outside a residence. Furniture designed for indoor use may not be placed or kept on lawns or porches that are not entirely enclosed.

Recreational Fires

No permit is required however, there are regulations. Recreational fires must be attended at all times. They shall be no closer than 15 feet from any structure or side lot line and 10 feet from any rear lot line. Recreational fires are allowed only during the following schedule:

- Sunday Thursday from 4PM to 10 PM
- Friday & Saturday from 4 PM to 1 AM the following day

Recreational fires shall only burn dry wood. All recreational fires must also be completely extinguished when unattended. Recreational fires with a base greater than 5 feet in diameter shall require a permit issued by the city manager or their designee. Contact Neighborhood Services for permit information.

Vehicles

Storage of junk vehicles is prohibited without a junk vehicle permit. All vehicles must be licensed and operable or covered with an approved car cover and on a hard surface. Visit the City of Whitewater's website at http://www.whitewater-wi.gov/department/ neighborhood-services

Parking

Parking is prohibited on most city streets between the hours of 2 AM and 5 AM. Winter parking restrictions begin on November 1 st and end on March 31 st (parking prohibited on all city streets from 2 AM to 6 AM). On-street parking is prohibited during snow emergencies. Other than in a paved parking lot, parking is prohibited on front and side lawn areas, and other areas of the property not designed for parking.

PUBLIC WORKS

DPW 2024 Projects

2024 will be a busy year for projects throughout the City. Following is a list of anticipated projects:

Ann Street/Fremont Street – Ann Street from Trippe Street to Fremont Street and Fremont Street from Ann Street to Whitewater Street will be reconstructed. Sanitary sewer, water, storm sewer, curb & gutter sidewalk and asphalt pavement will all be replaced. No work on Fremont Street will occur until after the July 4th Celebration.

Forest Avenue – Forest Avenue from 4th Street to Church Street will be reconstructed. Sanitary sewer, water, storm sewer, curb & gutter sidewalk and asphalt pavement will all be replaced. Construction is anticipated for summer.

Fremont Street – Fremont Street from Starin Road to Lauderdale Drive will be reconstructed. Sanitary sewer, water, storm sewer, curb & gutter sidewalk and asphalt pavement will all be replaced. Construction could start as soon as the weather allows and is anticipated to be completed by September.

Fremont Street – Fremont Street from Lauderdale Drive to Whitewater Creek will be pulverized and paved with new asphalt. The timeline on this closure will not be known until the project is awarded to a contractor.

Vanderlip Pumping Station – The Vanderlip Pumping Station located west on the extension of Carriage Drive will be replaced. The project involves replacing forcemain and relaying sanitary sewer. Updates to the pedestrian curb ramps will be made to bring them into ADA compliance. The Fraternity Pumping Station at the corner of Fraternity Lane and Florence Street will be removed. Work will occur on Fraternity Lane, Florence Street, Carriage Drive and Tratt Street. Tratt Street from Carriage Drive to Starin Road, including the intersection of Starin Road and Tratt Street, will be closed to traffic at some point in late summer.

Miscellaneous Paving – Pearson Lane, Pearson Court and Meadowview Court will be resurfaced with new asphalt pavement.

Chipsealing – Peninsula Lane, Tower Hill Pass, Black River Court, Stonefield Lane, Bluemound Drive and Bloomingfield Drive wests of Tratt Street will have the existing asphalt pavement chipsealed. During the process, no parking will be allowed on the streets, but the streets will remain open to traffic.

Looking ahead to 2025, Walworth Avenue from Janesville Street west to the City Limits (which is just west of the Highway 12 bypass) will be under construction. The project includes spot replacing of curb & gutter and sidewalk, and new asphalt pavement. The project is still in the design phase and no timing of when the work will be done is available at this time.

The Public Works Department is responsible for the operation and maintenance of water and sewer service, water quality, maintenance of vehicles, streets, facilities, parks, and many public projects.

Garbage and Recycling Pickup

John's Disposal is contracted by the City to supply trash, recycling and bulk pickup (old couches, dressers, beds, etc.). Trash pickup is on Thursdays, while recycling days are every other Thursday. Bulk pickup is the second Thursday of the month. Toters may not be set out earlier than 4 p.m. on Wednesdays and must be removed before 9 a.m. on Friday. If containers are left out there will be a \$25 fee charged. For more information, or to arrange special trash pickup, call John's Disposal at 262-473-4700 or the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560.

Month of May Bulk Pickup

For the month of May, Johns Disposal will perform bulk pickup on every Thurs. throughout the City. As with other bulk pickup days, please do not put items out for collection earlier than 4 p.m. on the Wed. prior.

Bulk Trash Pickup - Code Enforcement

Bulk pickup is scheduled on the second Thursday of the month. This service is provided to dispose of old couches, beds, dressers, etc. There is no charge, just leave the items at the curb for collection after 4:00 p.m. of the day before the collection day. The City will be enforcing these guidelines and NO warnings will be given. 8.28.090 - Penalty for Violations.

- (a) Any person who violates any provisions ofthis chapter shall be subject to a penalty of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$250.00 for a first offense, and on second and subsequent offenses not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$250.00, together with the cost of prosecution.
- (b) If any such owner, occupant or person in charge refuses or fails to comply with the provisions of this chapter, the city manager or his/ her appointed designee, may remove such items and the cost thereof shall be charged at a rate of time and materials as established by the department of public works, with a minimum charge of \$25.00, or contract with a private contractor to have the items removed. The cost of such removal shall be reported to the city finance department in writing with a description of the premises, and such charges if unpaid, shall become a lien on the property against

which it is imposed. The delinquent charge shall be included in the current or next tax roll and settlement under Chapter 74. If you would like bulk items removed immediately, call John's Disposal at (262) 473-4700 to schedule an appointment. Remember to ask John's about the cost associated with a special pick up.

Electronic Recycling

The City has contracted with a private firm to supply Electronic Recycling for the City. The date will be Saturday May 18, 2024. The location will be in Lot B which is located south of Whitewater Street and east of Fremont Street (parking lot for the Cravath Lakefront). The majority of items are free to recycle; however, there will be a small charge for TVs, computer tube monitors, microwaves and exercise equipment. Scheduled times are from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm. Please watch the website for additional information.

Streets/Forestry

The Streets Department maintains the upkeep of all City owned streets, sidewalks, street lights, signal lights, street signage, City owned parks including all entities assodated within all parks, all maintenance of City owned trees along with making sure our stormwater system is maintained and is in operation that meets or exceeds state and federal regulations.

Brush Collection

The City collects brush every Tuesday. Residents are asked to call the Public Works Department at 473-0560 to make an appointment. Appointments must be made prior to the Tuesday a.m. collection so route scheduling can be completed.

COLLECTION FEES: Brush located at the curbside will be collected and chipped. The first 10 minutes of chipping will be free of charge if an appointment has been received. Any chipping after the first ten minutes will be charged to the property owner at a rate of \$30.00 per ten-minute increments.

COLLECTION PROCEDURE: Brush must be brought to the curbside and placed with the cut ends facing the street. Brush cannot be brought to the curbside before 4 p.m. on the Sunday prior to the scheduled Tuesday for collection. Brush must be at the curb by 6 a.m. on Tuesday.

PUBLIC WORKS

BRUSH TO BE ACCEPTED OR NOT ACCEPTED:

Brush must be a minimum of 3/4" and a maximum 6" in diameter. The brush must be a minimum of 3 feet in length. Vines, rakings, roots, and root balls will not be accepted. Property owners can dispose of vines, rakings, roots, and root balls at the compost site. The City reserves the right to not collect brush for just cause. You may also submit a Brush Collection request at https://www.whitewaterwi.gov/RequestTracker.aspx

Tree Trimming

If you have a tree that is hazardous, diseased or dead within the public road right-of-way, contact the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560. There is no charge for this service. You may also submit a tree-trimming request at https://www. whitewater-wi.gov/RequestTracker.aspx.

Are you unsure whether a tree on your property belongs to the City or you, the property owner?

City owned trees are located in the terrace, which is the area between your sidewalk and the curb. However, there are many areas in the City of Whitewater that do not have sidewalks. If you are in that situation, please call the Forestry Department at (262) 473-0560 and they will determine if the tree belongs to you, or the City. Per the City's Municipal Code, it is a violation for anyone, other than the City, to remove a City tree. Violators can be fined and charged replacement costs to have the tree replaced.

Leaf and Yard Waste Collection

Leaf and yard waste collection is collected in the spring and fall each year. Collection dates in the November 6 and November 13. A dumpster will be Yard waste must be bagged in clear or transparent bags only. The City offers Bio-Bags in the fall only and are available in the Finance Department free of charge while supplies last. Yard waste will not be collected if not properly bagged or placed in non-transparent or black bags. Please place your bagged yard waste by the curb on the first Monday of collection. Brush will not be collected as part of the vard waste collection. For more information. visit the City's website at www.whitewater-wi.gov. Bio-Bags fill in the fall and have been left in the elements during the winter months will NOT be collected during the spring collection.

Compost Site

The compost site is available to City of Whitewater residents only. It is located at 599 N. Jefferson Street. Residents may bring yard waste to the site for disposal. The compost site will open Saturday, April 6, 2024 (weather permitting). The compost site is open on Wednesdays form 3 pm to 7 pm and Saturdays form 8 am to 2 pm. In the fall, the hours change to 2 pm to 6 pm on Wednesdays due to the shortened daylight hours. The compost site will close for the season on Wednesday, November 20, 2024. Residents are required to empty the yard waste from any container used in the transportation of the vard waste and take the container(s) home. Residents can also help themselves to composted material or wood chips at the site. Residents must load their own compost or wood chips. The City will provide a loader for loading chips and compost into resident's trailers and trucks on the first Saturday of every month until the site closes for the season. Please allow enough time to unload and exit the gate before the posted closing time.

Potholes

The City anticipates pothole issues on streets when the weather warms. These potholes will reveal themselves primarily in late March or April when the ground thaws. To report a pothole, residents should contact the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560 or submit a web site request at https://www.whitewater-wi.gov/RequestTracker. aspx. Thank you for your patience and drive safely!

Winter Parking Hours

On-street parking is prohibited when snowplowing or snow removal operations are in progress. 11.16.020 (a) It is unlawful for the operator or owner of any

- (a) It is unlawful for the operator or owner of any vehicle to park the vehicle on any street in the city between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. on any day from November 1st of each year to March 31st of each year, except as hereinafter provided:
 - Physicians and surgeons shall be permitted to park vehicles at any time when the physician is on an emergency call.
 - (2) Parking shall be permitted in the downtown parking area after 5 a.m. of such period; and
 - (3) By special advance arrangement with the Streets Superintendent, Kelly Freeman, 262-473-0560.

(b) Any person who violates the provisions of this section shall be subject to the penalties and provisions set forth at Sections 11.56.010(4) and 11.56.010(5) of this title.

Removal of Snow and Ice from Sidewalks

The owner, occupant, and person in charge of any building or lot fronting upon or adjoining any sidewalk shall remove all snow and ice from the sidewalk no later than twenty-four hours after a snow or ice event. The fee for our City crew to remove snow/ice is a minimum of \$100. For more information, visit the City's website - Code of Ordinance 12.20.020 - Snow and ice removal required.

Storm Water Catch Basins

Fines and/or penalties will be imposed on those who are caught unlawfully dumping any substance into storm water catch basins. Substances like household chemicals, grass clippings, leaves, fertilizers, insecticides, automotive fluids, olls, paints, pet waste and commercial waste are prohibited. Anything dumped into the storm water catch basins travels through storm drains to local streams and rivers. These pollutants harm water quality and can kill aquatic life. Residents are encouraged to report illegal dumping by calling the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560.

Become a Storm Water Drain Protector

The City of Whitewater is part of the Rock River Storm Group (RRSG), a group of surrounding communities committed to improving the health of the Rock River and other local waterways. As part of this effort, we have teamed with a marketing group from UW Whitewater who helps the RRSG get the word out on activities to protect Wisconsin Waterways. One such activity is to become s Storm Drain Protector. By becoming a Storm Drain Protector you agree to help prevent pollution from reaching storm drains by keeping the area around the storm drains free of debris and pollutants. Wastewater Department

The Wastewater Utility returns all consumed water within the City of Whitewater back into the environment in a responsible fashion that meets or exceeds State and Federal regulations. In order to do so, utility staff is tasked with maintaining and operating the public conveyance system or the "collection system" along with the treatment facility and its associated programs.

Coping with a Sewer Backup

If you experience a sewer backup between the hours of 6:00 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Monday-Thursday, or 6:00-10:00 a.m., call the Wastewater Utility at 262-473-0560. If outside of these hours, please call Police Dispatch at 262-473-0555, option 4. We will dispatch a maintenance crew to your address and determine if the blockage is In the public system or your private line (sewer lateral). If the sewer main is found to be clear, it is the responsibility of the property owner to correct the problem. The City cannot recommend a plumber; however, a list of area businesses that provide this service is available. We do recommend residents obtain multiple quotations and check references prior to having the work done. If the blockage is in the City system, we will fix it as quickly as possible and keep you informed about what is being done.

Sanitary Sewer and Water Lateral

If a failure occurs in the sanitary sewer or water lateral, between your home and the public utility connection, it would be your responsibility, as the homeowner, to pay for any repairs. The public connection for sanitary sewer laterals is at the sanitary sewer main, typically in the middle of the street. The public connection for water laterals is at the water shut off valve, typically near the sidewalk area. We recommend residents communicate with their homeowner insurance carrier to learn more about coverage options.

No Wipes Down the Pipes


Even if a product says it Is flushable, do not flush it down the toilet. Only toilet paper should be flushed! The following items should be placed in a trashcan: flushable/disposable cleaning or baby wipes, paper or cloth towels, any type of rags, feminine hygiene products and facial tissues. Putting these items down toilets may plug sewers and cause raw sewage to back up into your and your neighbors' homes.

Help Us Maintain Healthy Pipes

Grease Concerns - In order to maintain reliable sanitary sewer services for public health and safety, grease should never be put down pipes. Grease and sand can settle out and possibly solidify as it would in a pot or pan in your household. Over time this causes the sanitary line (your private line or the public mainline) to become smaller and smaller. The result is a blockage in the line, which will result in sewage in your home, business, your neighbors' home or overflowing the system into the environment.

Clean Water Concerns

Roof drains, sump pumps, and/or foundation drains connected to the City's sanitary sewer system is illegal. These cross connections send groundwater or rainfall to the Wastewater Treatment Plant, consuming valuable treatment capacity. Please familiarize yourself with your house plumbing system. You may be contributing to the problem if you have roof downspouts that are piped underground, a sump pump that has no identifiable discharge point, or foundation drains that do not discharge to a low point on your property. Residents must disconnect unlawful connections to the sewer system. You may contact the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560 to find reasonable alternatives.
