Lifeguard Training

Lifeguard training is designed to provide participants with the knowledge and skills to prevent, recognize and respond to emergencies in and around the pool and water park environments. Participants must successfully complete the following pre-requisite skills.

- 15-years-old ● **Fee:** \$250.00 **Class dates:** TBD
- 300 yard swim using front crawl and breaststroke
- Tread water two minutes using only legs
- Timed event: Swim 20 yards, retrieve a 10 pound brick from the deep end and swim back to the shallow end with both hands on the brick.
- Upon successful completion of water skills and written exam, participants receive certification in ARC Lifeguard and Waterpark skills (including CPR/1st Aid)
- Certification is valid for 2 years

Lifeguard Re-Certification and Review

Participants must be currently Red Cross certified to participate. Contact the Whitewater Aquatic and Fitness Center to schedule a training date and time. **Fee:** \$100

CRAVATH AND TRIPPE LAKE PROJECT UPDATES

Drawdown Project Updates



Our lake project is well underway. With a few struggles along the way the project will continue through spring of 2021. The lakes drawdown project began on July 8, 2019 with the start of drawing down Cravath Lake. This was followed with the start of Tippe Lake on August 5, 2019. The lakes were drawn down 1-2 inches a day on average throughout the fall. Through the fall the lakes have been drawn down part of the way. The process will continue through the spring and summer of 2020. The plan is to draw down the water level 5 to 6 feet for each lake.

The proposed dredging phase of the project is scheduled to take place the winter of 2020/2021. Both lakes will then be allowed to be refilled in the spring of 2021. The goal of this project is to improve water quality and depth as well as reduce and/or eliminate invasive aquatic plant species and allow for native plants to return. Please follow our website www.whitewater-wi.gov for more information as this exciting project begins.

Lakes Drawdown FAQ's

Q: What is a lakes drawdown?

A: For Cravath and Trippe Lakes a drawdown would be performed by opening the dams and allowing the water level to slowly lower until the water level is down to a stream bed. A lake drawdown is one tool that can be used to manage aquatic weed problems. Lake level drawdowns often start in the fall and continue through the winter when water recreation uses are at their lowest. Most aquatic weeds are found near the shallow shoreline.

Q: What will happen to the fish and other wildlife in the lake?

A: The drawdown must happen gradually so all fish and wildlife has enough time to locate to deeper water. The fish are expected to move with the water as the lake level goes down. It is possible that some fish may perish if they don't move up or down stream quickly enough, but this is not expected to be significant. After the drawdown process is complete there will be a plan in place to restock to allow for a healthier fish population to return.

Facility Rentals

Reservations for city facilities can be made through the Parks and Recreation Department. All reservations can be made online along with a complete facility reservation policy at wwparks.org.

- Municipal facilities can be reserved from 6:00 am until 11:00 pm.
- No alcohol is allowed in city parks and facilities except by permit.
- Alcohol permits are \$10.00 and must be applied for with the City Clerk's office two weeks prior to the event.
- A security/damage deposit of \$200.00 is required for all reservations at the Cravath Lakefront Community Center, Armory, and Starin Park Community Building.
- Credit card use is acceptable for rentals and damage deposits.
- The use of tent structures must be approved at time of facility request submission.

The facilities listed below must be rented a minimum of four (4) hours. Online reservations will be posted in four (4), eight (8), and sixteen (16) hour blocks. Requests outside of these blocks should be addressed with Parks and Recreation staff. Each facility is equipped with tables and chairs and small serving kitchens.

FACILITIES



PARK RULES AND REGULATIONS

Park Hours: 6:00 am–12:00 am except Indian Mounds Park (Sunrise–Sunset) and Brewery Hill Park (6:00 am–Dusk)

Trail Hours: Open 24 hours per day

Park Rest Rooms: Open April 1–October 31

RESERVATION OF SHELTERS:

Shelters may be reserved the weekend closest to April 15 through the weekend closest to October 31. If not reserved, shelters are available on a first come, first-served basis.

DAMAGE TO PROPERTY:

Persons shall not in any manner mar, injure, deface, or destroy any tree, shrub, or plant standing or growing in the park, nor any fence, guide post, sign, table, bench, building, or any other thing of value in any public park, grounds, or place, nor shall they disturb or interfere with any wildlife within the parks.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:

No alcoholic beverages are allowed in any city park other than Starin Park. The City Clerk may issue permits allowing the consumption of alcoholic beverages in Cravath Lake Park, Trippe Lake Park, Starin Park Community Building and other municipal buildings as deemed appropriate. A permit may be granted by the Common Council pertaining to the consumption of alcoholic beverages in parks other than Starin Park, Cravath Lake Park and Trippe Lake Park.

GLASS BEVERAGE CONTAINERS:

All glass beverage containers are prohibited within the parks.

SALE OF FOOD AND/OR MERCHANDISE:

Food and/or merchandise shall not be sold in any city park except by agreement or permit issued by the City Clerk.

MOTORIZED VEHICLES:

It is unlawful for any person to operate a motorcycle, minibike, snowmobile, dune buggy, go cart, all-terrain vehicle or other recreational vehicle or motor vehicle in any park in the City of Whitewater. This section does not prohibit a person from legally operating a motor vehicle on public roads within parks; from parking on park property adjacent to public roads in the park; or from operating motorboats on lakes that are part of a park. It is unlawful for any person to operate a bicycle within Indian Mounds Park. Motorized vehicles are not allowed on city trails.

AMPLIFICATION OF SOUND:

Use of amplification systems within the parks for the purpose of public entertainment must obtain a Public Entertainment Permit through the City Clerk's Office if said amplification system is not part of an authorized recreation program. It is the responsibility of the group using/reserving the facility/park to keep the noise level acceptable so as not to annoy or disturb the surrounding area of the park.

FIRES:

All fires must be contained within grills or designated cooking devices. Coals must be thoroughly extinguished and cooled prior to being placed in a trash receptacle.

ANIMALS:

Any person owning, keeping, or in charge of any animal shall not permit such animal to be in Indian Mounds Park or in any municipal buildings at any time. This will not be applicable in cases in which a person is being assisted by a service dog. Animals are permitted in all other municipal parks and open space. Owners are required to keep their pet on a leash and clean up after their animals and follow proper pet etiquette.

ARCHERY:

Archery is prohibited in all parks except as part of an authorized recreation program.

GOLF:

The use of golf equipment is prohibited in all parks.

SLOW-NO-WAKE AREAS:

Tripe and Cravath Lake are areas designated as slow-no-wake. This means that speed at which a boat moves as slowly as possible while still maintaining steerage control. This is to provide safe and healthful conditions for the enjoyment of aquatic recreation consistent with public rights and interests.

FIREWORKS:

Fireworks are prohibited except for programs that have obtained the necessary City of Whitewater permits for such activity.

CAMPING:

Camping is prohibited in all parks except by special permit of the Common Council. Tents and Trailers are allowed by permission of the Parks and Recreation Director.

LITTERING:

No person shall place or leave any garbage, paper or refuse in any park, except in a park container or receptacle provided. No person shall bring garbage, paper or refuse from outside a park and deposit it in a park receptacle or container.

MECHANICAL RIDES/DUNK TANKS:

Use of mechanical rides or dunk tanks within the parks must be approved with written permission from the Parks and Recreation Director.

VIOLETION OF THE ABOVE RULES IN REGARDS TO POSSESSION OF ALCOHOL IN PARKS SHALL BE PUNISHABLE BY FORFEITURE OF NOT LESS THAN \$150 NOR MORE THAN \$300 FOR THE FIRST OFFENSE AND FOR SUBSEQUENT OFFENSES, NOT LESS THAN \$200 NOR MORE THAN \$350 TOGETHER WITH THE COSTS OF PROSECUTION. VIOLATION OF OTHER REGULATIONS IS PUNISHABLE BY FORFEITURE OF NOT LESS THAN \$50 NOR MORE THAN \$150 TOGETHER WITH THE COSTS OF PROSECUTION. ANY VIOLATION MAY ALSO RESULT IN EXPULSION FROM ALL CITY PARKS FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO ONE YEAR. IN ADDITION TO THE RULES AND REGULATIONS LISTED ALL CITY, STATE, AND FEDERAL LAWS APPLY.

Whitewater Common Council

The City of Whitewater operates under the City Manager form of government with a seven-member council. The City Manager plans and directs the administration of the City to ensure that efficient municipal services are provided and are in line with Common Council objectives. Council Members are elected each April to serve two-year terms. There are five aldermanic district council positions and two councilmember-at-large positions. Odd number district seats are up for election in odd years; seats for even-numbered districts are up for election in even-numbered years. One council member-at-large seat opens each calendar year. The Common Council meets on the first and third Tuesdays of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Community Room of the Municipal Building located at 312 W. Whitewater St., Whitewater, WI 53190. However, if there is an election scheduled on a council meeting Tuesday, the meeting is rescheduled for the Thursday following the regularly-scheduled meeting.

Alcohol in Parks

Anyone wishing to consume alcoholic beverages in a city park needs a permit. Permits can be found on the City Clerk's web page at <https://www.whitewater-wi.gov/174/Licensing> or at the City Clerk's office. Send a completed application to the City Clerk, along with the \$10 fee (checks payable to the City of Whitewater), five days prior to the event.

Beverage Operator's License

A Beverage Operator's License is required of those who wish to work unsupervised at an establishment which sells beer or any alcohol product, whether sold in packaged form or by the glass. Complete the application and license fee (1 year license: \$20.00 2 year license: \$30.00) along with proof of enrollment in, or completion of a Responsible Beverage Server Training Course as approved by the State of Wisconsin. CDA

The Whitewater Community Development Authority (CDA) is the economic development agency for the City of Whitewater. It is governed by a seven member Board of Directors. The CDA, through a paid professional staff, works to recruit and retain business and create employment opportunities by using a variety of strategies, incentives and assistance. The CDA markets the City of Whitewater externally to businesses and individuals looking to relocate to Whitewater or start a new business here. Make sure you are living legally

How many non-family household members can I have in a single-family house? If you are in an R-1 or R-2 Zoning districts anywhere in the city you can only have 3 unrelated non-family household members. If you are in the R-3 Zoning anywhere in the city you cannot have more than 5 unrelated non-family household members. Don't skip the permit

Grass Length

Grass length should not exceed seven (7) inches in height Sections 11.56.010(4) and 11.56.010(5) of this title.

Bulk Trash Pickup

Bulk pickup is scheduled on the second Thursday of the month. This service is provided to dispose of old couches, beds, dressers, etc. There is no charge, just leave the items on the front yard next to the road after 4 p.m. the day before the pickup. If you would like bulk items removed immediately, call John's Disposal at 262- 473-4700 to schedule an appointment. Ask John's about the cost of collection.

Streets/Forestry

The Streets Department maintains the upkeep of all City owned streets, sidewalks, street lights, signal lights, street signage, City owned parks including all entities associated within all parks, all maintenance of City owned trees along with making sure our stormwater system is maintained and is in operation that meets or exceeds state and federal regulations.

Brush Collection

The City collects brush every Tuesday. Residents are asked to call the Public Works Department at 473-0560 to make an appointment. Appointments must be made prior to the Tuesday a.m. collection so route scheduling can be completed.

COLLECTION FEES: Brush located at the curbside will be collected and chipped. The first 10 minutes of chipping will be free of charge if an appointment has been received. Any chipping after the first ten minutes will be charged to the property owner at a rate of \$30.00 per ten-minute increments.

COLLECTION PROCEDURE: Brush must be brought to the curbside and placed with the cut ends facing the street. Brush cannot be brought to the curbside before 4 p.m. on the Sunday prior to the scheduled Tuesday for collection. Brush must be at the curb by 7 a.m. on Tuesday.

BRUSH TO BE ACCEPTED OR NOT ACCEPTED: Brush must be a minimum of 3/4" and a maximum 6" in diameter. The brush must be a minimum of 3 feet in length. Vines, rakings, roots, and root balls will not be accepted. Property owners can dispose of vines, rakings, roots, and root balls at the compost site. The City reserves the right to not collect brush for just cause.

Tree Trimming

If you have a tree that is hazardous, diseased or dead within the public road right-of-way, contact the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560. There is no charge for this service. You may also submit a tree-trimming request at <https://www.whitewater-wi.gov/RequestTracker.aspx>.

Potholes

The City anticipates pothole issues on streets when the weather warms. These potholes will reveal themselves primarily in late March or April when the ground thaws. To report a pothole, residents should contact the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560 or submit a web site request at <https://www.whitewater-wi.gov/RequestTracker.aspx>. The Public Works Department is responsible for the operation and maintenance of water and sewer service, water quality, maintenance of vehicles, streets, facilities, parks, and many public projects.

Garbage and Recycling Pickup

John's Disposal is contracted by the City to supply trash, recycling and bulk pickup (old couches, dressers, beds, etc.). Trash pickup is on Thursdays, while recycling days are every other Thursday. Bulk pickup is the second Thursday of the month. Toters may not be set out earlier than 4 p.m. on Wednesdays and must be removed before 9 a.m. on Friday. If containers are left out there will be a \$25 fee charged. For more information, or to arrange special trash pickup, call John's Disposal at 262-473-4700 or the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560.

Compost Site

The compost site is available to City of Whitewater residents only. It is located at 599 N. Jefferson Street. Residents may bring yard waste to the site for disposal. The compost site will open when the weather allows in late March/early April. The compost site is open on Wednesdays from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. In the fall, the hours are 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. on Wednesdays due to shortened daylight hours. Residents are required to empty the yard waste from any container used in the transportation of the yard waste and take the container(s) home. Residents can also help themselves to composted material or wood chips at the site. Residents must load their own compost or wood chips. The City will provide a loader for loading chips and compost into resident's trailers and trucks on the first Saturday of every month until the site closes for the season. Please allow enough time to unload and exit the gate before the posted closing time.

Leaf and Yard Waste Collection

Leaf and yard waste collection is collected in the spring and fall each year. Yard waste must be bagged in clear or transparent bags only. The City offers Bio-Bags in the fall only and are available in the Finance Department free of charge while supplies last. Yard waste will not be collected if not properly bagged or placed in non-transparent or black bags. Please place your bagged yard waste by the curb on the first Monday of collection. Brush will not be collected as part of the yard waste collection. For more information, visit the City's website at www.whitewater-wi.gov.

Winter Parking Hours

On-street parking is prohibited when snowplowing or snow removal operations are in progress. 11.16.020

(a) It is unlawful for the operator or owner of any vehicle to park the vehicle on any street in the city between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. on any day from November 1st of each year to March 31st of each year, except as hereinafter provided:

- (1) Physicians and surgeons shall be permitted to park vehicles at any time when the physician is on an emergency call.
- (2) Parking shall be permitted in the downtown parking area after 5 a.m. of such period; and
- (3) By special advance arrangement with the Streets Superintendent, Kelly Freeman, 262-473-0560.

(b) Any person who violates the provisions of this section shall be subject to the penalties and provisions set forth at Sections 11.56.010(4) and 11.56.010(5) of this title.

Removal of Snow and Ice from Sidewalks

The owner, occupant, and person in charge of any building or lot fronting upon or adjoining any sidewalk shall remove all snow and ice from the sidewalk no later than twenty-four hours after a snow or ice event. The fee for our City crew to remove snow/ice, if needed has been raised to a minimum of \$100. For more information, visit the City's website - Code of Ordinance 12.20.020 - Snow and ice removal required.

Storm Water Catch Basins

Fines and/or penalties will be imposed on those who are caught unlawfully dumping any substance into storm water catch basins.

Substances like household chemicals, grass clippings, leaves, fertilizers, insecticides, automotive fluids, oils, paints, pet waste and commercial waste are prohibited. Anything dumped into the storm water catch basins travels through storm drains to local streams and rivers. These pollutants harm water quality and can kill aquatic life. Residents are encouraged to report illegal dumping by calling the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560.

Wastewater Department

The Wastewater Utility returns all consumed water within the City of Whitewater back into the environment in a responsible fashion that meets or exceeds State and Federal regulations. In order to do so, utility staff is tasked with maintaining and operating the public conveyance system or the "collection system" along with the treatment facility and its associated programs.

Coping with a Sewer Backup

If you experience a sewer backup Monday through Friday, between the hours of 7:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m., call the Wastewater Utility at 262-473-0560. If outside of these hours, please call Police Dispatch at 262-473-0555, option 4. We will dispatch a maintenance crew to your address and determine if the blockage is in the public system or your private line (sewer lateral). If the sewer main is found to be clear, it is the responsibility of the property owner to correct the problem. The City cannot recommend a plumber; however, a list of area businesses that provide this service is available. We do recommend residents obtain multiple quotations and check references prior to having the work done. If the blockage is in the City system, we will fix it as quickly as possible and keep you informed about what is being done.

Sanitary Sewer and Water Lateral Insurance Coverage

If a failure occurs in the sanitary sewer or water lateral, between your home and the public utility connection, it would be your responsibility, as the homeowner, to pay for any repairs. The public connection for sanitary sewer laterals is at the sanitary sewer main, typically in the middle of the street. The public connection for water laterals is at the water shut off valve, typically near the sidewalk area. We recommend residents communicate with their homeowner insurance carrier to learn more about coverage options.

No Wipes Down the Pipes

Even if a product says it is flushable, do not flush it down the toilet. Only toilet paper should be flushed! The following items should be placed in a trashcan: flushable/disposable cleaning or baby wipes, paper or cloth towels, any type of rags, feminine hygiene products and facial tissues. Putting these items down toilets may plug sewers and cause raw sewage to back up into your and your neighbors' homes.

Help Us Maintain Healthy Pipes

Grease Concerns - In order to maintain reliable sanitary sewer services for public health and safety, grease should never be put down pipes. Grease and sand can settle out and possibly solidify as it would in a pot or pan in your household. Over time this causes the sanitary line (your private line or the public mainline) to become smaller and smaller. The result is a blockage in the line, which will result in sewage in your home, business, your neighbors' home or overflowing the system into the environment.

DPW continued

Clean Water Concerns

Roof drains, sump pumps, and/or foundation drains connected to the City's sanitary sewer system is illegal. These cross connections send groundwater or rainfall to the Wastewater Treatment Plant, consuming valuable treatment capacity. Please familiarize yourself with your house plumbing system. You may be contributing to the problem if you have roof downspouts that are piped underground, a sump pump that has no identifiable discharge point, or foundation drains that do not discharge to a low point on your property. Residents must disconnect unlawful connections to the sewer system. You may contact the Public Works Department at 262-473-0560 to find reasonable alternatives.

Drug Drop Box

A prescription drug box is conveniently located in the Fremont Street foyer of the Whitewater Municipal Building at 312 W. Whitewater St. and is accessible during normal business hours. This is in place to encourage the proper disposal of medical and prescription waste. This free service is available to all residents of Whitewater. Most medical substances cannot be removed through normal water-treatment processes. If not disposed of properly, this would result in the discharge of substances into the environment.

Milwaukee Street Reconstruction

Contractors will be completing the remaining work on Milwaukee Street from Rice Street to the round-a-bout this year. Work includes: sanitary sewer, storm sewer, curb and gutter, concrete pavement, sidewalks, painting and restoration. Crews will also be working on Elkhorn Road from the round-a-bout to STH 12. This section of work includes: storm sewer, ditch grading, asphalt mill and overlay, and concrete pavement. All work is to be completed by July 21, 2020. During construction the streets will be closed to thru traffic but will remain open to local businesses. The round-a-bout will remain open at all times.

Clay Street Reconstruction

Clay Street from Dann Street to Rice Street will be under construction in 2020. The project includes: sanitary sewer, water main, storm sewer, curb and gutter, asphalt pavement, sidewalks and restoration. The project is anticipated to start late March/early April with a completion date of November. The contractor cannot close the intersection of Rice Street and Clay Street until Milwaukee Street is open to traffic.

CITATION PROCEDURES

AFTER RECEIVING YOUR CITATION:

You must either:

- A) Post bond and/or enter a plea by mail or in person.
- B) Appear in court on your court date.

Types of Pleas:

Not Guilty: Must be entered in writing before your court date or during your court date.

Guilty or No Contest: Will result in finding of guilty.

If you do not pay a levied fine, a warrant may be issued for your arrest. If your violation was a moving traffic violation your driving privileges could be suspended for up to 1 year. After 90 days, your file will be referred to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) for collection. The DOR will add to the balance owing on the debt a collection fee of 15% of the debt or \$35, whichever is greater. For additional information: www.whitewater-wi.gov/234/Municipal-Court

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

The Finance Department Manages the City's day-to-day finances. Budgeting, investments, payroll, accounts payable and accounts receivable. Issues, accepts, and processes Water/Sewer utility payments. Issues, accepts tax payments and processes property and personal property taxes December – January 31st. (After January 31st payments must go to the appropriate county office.) Issues, accepts and processes miscellaneous invoice payments. Issues dog licenses and accepts court payments when the Clerk of Court is not available.

Selling Alcohol

It is against the law to charge for alcoholic beverages at the door of a party, charge for alcoholic beverages in a package deal (such as providing beer with dinner, selling cups to fill with free beer or charge for a band or other entertainment and “giveaway” the alcohol, etc.) or to be frequenting a place of illegal activity such as a party where alcohol is being served illegally.

Guideline for Parties & Special Events

The following is a list of suggestions for all Whitewater residents regarding hosting parties:

- Visit surrounding neighbors, be friendly, and make sure they know a couple of days in advance that a party will occur.
- Ask guests to respect the neighbors. The host is responsible for the condition of the neighborhood after the party.
- Do not advertise alcohol-related parties to the general public.
- Monitor your party. Keep it under control if you are outside, or have open windows.
- Do not sponsor large open parties which tend to get out of control.
- Do not allow underage drinking.
- Do not carry open containers of alcoholic beverages beyond your private property. This is illegal in Whitewater even if you are over 21 years of age.
- Do not let anyone drive home under the influence of alcohol.

P3 Tips Anonymous Tip System

The Whitewater Police Department is partnering with Walworth County Crime Stoppers to provide an easy and secure option for submitting anonymous community crime tips. Community members can access P3 Tips via their web site at <http://www.p3tips.com> or by downloading the app from the App Store or Google play. Tips are still welcomed through the Crime Stoppers hotline by dialing 262-723- 2677. Tips submitted through the P3 Tips sophisticated encryption processes obscure any and all identifying information and provide assured anonymity for tipsters.

Animal Control

Animal owners must have their dogs and/or cats under voice command or on a leash. If your animal is at-large it will be impounded at Lakeland Animal Shelter. Dogs must be licensed through the City of Whitewater. Licenses may be purchased at the Finance Department. Animals which habitually bark or cry are prohibited. Citations can be issued for noncompliance of these ordinances.

Individuals seeking lost/found property must come to the Whitewater Police Department Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 4:30 pm, and be prepared to present either written documentation or give a verbal confirmation of ownership.

WHITEWATER FIRE DEPARTMENT INC.



The volunteer fire department provides fire protection for the City from one fire station located at 312 West Whitewater Street. Whitewater currently has an ISO rating of 3. Its personnel are well trained in the most modern fire fighting methods and are constantly training to keep pace with new techniques. The Fire Department began in 1871. The Rescue Squad portion began in 1927. As of 2015, the Whitewater Fire Dept. responded to 500 fire and technical rescue calls, as well as 1500 EMS calls.

Anyone is eligible to apply to become a Firefighter or Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). Applications are available from the police department dispatch office. To be a successful EMT applicant, AT LEAST the following must be true: there must be an available opening, the individual must pass a physical, the individual must pass a background check, the individual must be available to sign up for a certain amount of hours to be on-call, the individual must be at least 18 years old. A Firefighter applicant must also be able bodied and capable of performing the tasks required of a firefighter.

WATER DEPARTMENT



The Water Utility is responsible for the daily operation, maintenance, repair and construction of wells, pumping operations, water mains, water storage vessels, hydrants and metering for the City's potable water system all while meeting and exceeding State and Federal regulations in an environmentally friendly manner.

Utility Billing

If you have questions regarding your bill, are looking to setup, end or transfer a utility account please contact Utility Billing at 262-473-1383.

Utility Bill Pay

Free online and phone Utility Bill Payment is available. This service is hosted by Payment Services Network (PSN). Login or create an account. Your Utility Bill will be needed to set up your account.

Billing information will be available within the next month. It will take 24 hours to load the last 12 months of billing information, however, the account will continue to receive the billing information after the first one-time request. We also offer an IVR (pay by phone) service at 877-885-7968 option 1.

Mobile App

PSN now has a mobile app for android and iPhone. Visit the Google play store or iTunes to download the free mobile app. Search for "PSN Payments".

Hydrant Flushing

The City's water main and hydrant flushing program takes place each spring and fall. Flushing of the water mains is necessary in order to continue to deliver clean, safe water to our citizens. Flushing of the water mains and hydrants can cause some discoloration in the water. Caution should be exercised in washing of white clothing. Discoloration in the water due to flushing WILL stain white clothing. We notify the public by using all local media; therefore, we cannot be responsible for stained clothing. If discoloration is detected, run the cold-water faucet until the discoloration clears. If reduced pressure is experienced after flushing, you may have to clean the aerators on your house faucets. If you have any questions, please contact the Water Utility at 262-473-0560.

The valve on the street side of my water meter is leaking. Will the City repair it?

The City maintains the water line within the public road right-of-way and the meter itself. The rest of the system is the responsibility of the homeowner. The City does not provide repair service. The Utilities Division will shut off the water at the curb box if needed for a repair.

In an emergency situation, call the Water Works Department at 262-473-0560 or, if it is an evening or weekend, the Police Department at 262-473-0555, option 4 so a maintenance worker can be dispatched to shut off your water. If your repair is not an emergency, please call the Water Works Department at least 24 hours before the repair is to be made to schedule the water shut off.

The curb box will be located ahead of time and checked for operability. A maintenance worker will meet with you or your representative at the scheduled time to shut off the water.

Discolored Water or Unpleasant Odors

Iron and manganese, which occur naturally in well water, can cause a rusty color. The City has pressure iron filters at the source to remove iron. It is not harmful. Run your water until it clears.

An unpleasant odor (usually described as smelling like rotten eggs) is almost always a problem with the water heater. A heating anode in the unit may be the culprit. Consult your plumber.

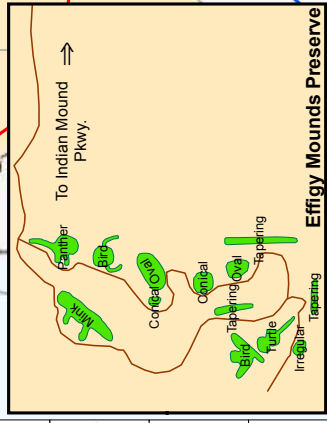
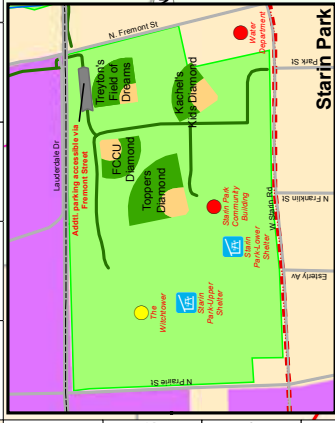
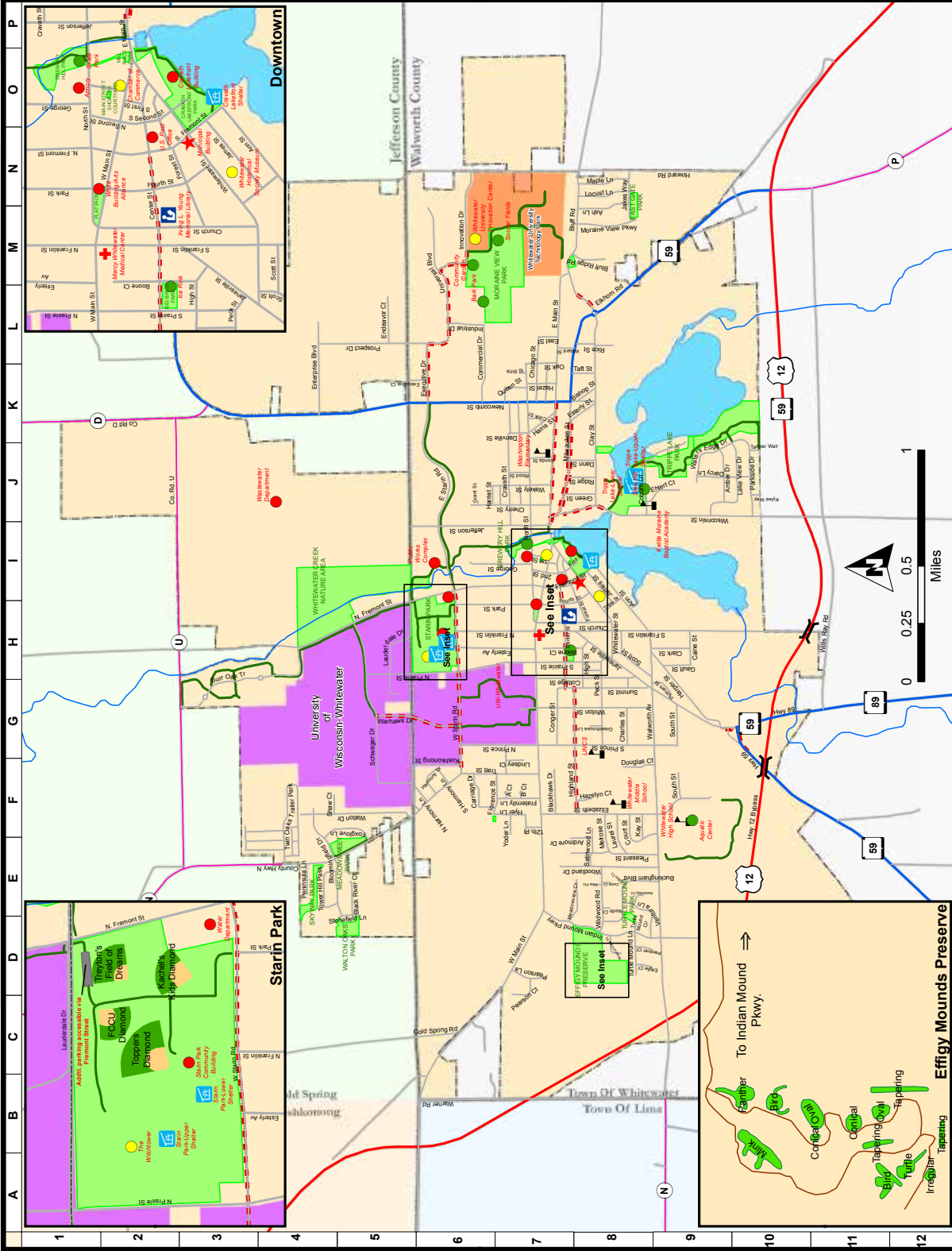
Snowbirds: Winterize Your Home When You're Away

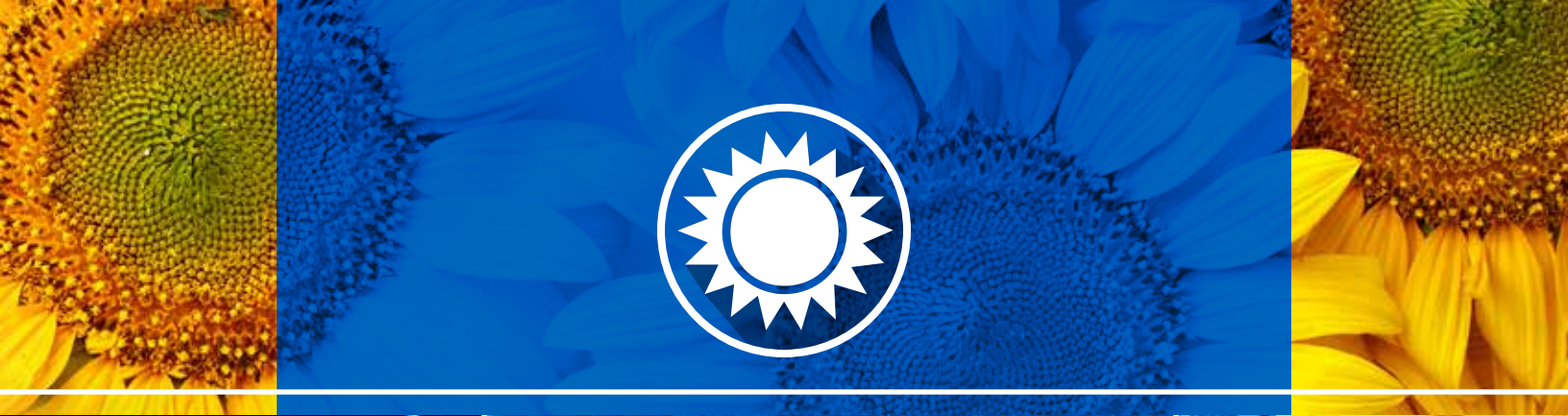

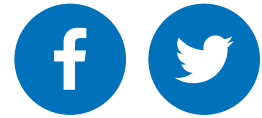
